Wildcats come up big with Senior Night victory over Ottawa



The Louisburg football team earned its second consecutive win with a 20-13 win over Ottawa on Senior Night last Friday.

Louisburg didn't just win Friday night — the Wildcats proved they're starting to find their stride.

Behind a punishing ground game from Blaise Vohs and a defense that came up clutch when it mattered most, the Wildcats held off Ottawa, 20-13, to notch their second straight victory on Senior Night.

"This was definitely a big win for us," head coach Drew Harding said. "We've been getting better the past several weeks, and it's nice to see it pay off on the scoreboard, not just in practice. I thought this was our best game of the year in terms of executing our game plan."

Louisburg didn't start fast, but it finished strong. Ottawa struck first with a 4-yard touchdown run from Aaron Blaine to take a 6-0 lead in the opening quarter. The Cyclones threatened to add more points early, but the Wildcats' defense refused to let the game get away.

A key fourth-down stop midway through the second quarter flipped the momentum, and on the very next play, Louisburg running back Blaise Vohs provided the spark his team needed. Vohs broke free for a 72-yard run down the sideline, setting up his own 1-yard touchdown plunge moments later. His extra point gave the Wildcats a 7-6 lead at halftime, and from there, they never looked back.

In the third quarter, quarterback Max Amren capped another methodical drive with a 3-yard scoring run to make it 13-6. Meanwhile, the Wildcats' defense continued to shine, creating turnovers that set up the offense with short fields. Louisburg picked off three passes — one each by Cole Heinrich, Gage Feldkamp, and Mathias Wright — and it was Wright's 40-yard interception return in the fourth quarter that proved to be the dagger.

Moments later, Vohs found the end zone again from a yard out, giving the Wildcats a 20-6 cushion. Ottawa answered late with a 19-yard touchdown run by Armoni Velez, but was too little too late for the Cyclones..

Vohs was the engine that drove the offense, rushing 26 times for 212 yards — including several key runs that kept drives alive. Amren added 22 yards on the ground and completed 8 of 10 passes for 69 yards. John Guetterman led the receiving corps with six catches for 68 yards, while Feldkamp anchored the defense with 10 tackles. Guetterman also had nine stops in the win.

Harding praised both his defense and his senior leaders for setting the tone in a high-stakes game.

"We had some key defensive stops early in the game," Harding said. "They had jumped out early and were in good position a couple of times to score again, but our guys kept battling and got some key stops to keep it close. I think this team has shown all year that they'll continue to fight regardless of the situation."

Vohs's impact, Harding said, has been a major factor in the team's recent surge.

"Blaise has been a huge boost for us offensively since he came back from injury," Harding said. "He has a knack for breaking tackles and has the speed to make big plays. He made several big runs for us tonight, and we're excited to see him continue to get better." The win was especially meaningful as it came on Senior Night, giving the Wildcats' upperclassmen a fitting send-off as Johnny Hendrickson, Michael Foote, Ayden Spradling, Martin Soto, Rickey Giles, Blaise Vohs and Gage Feldkamp played their final home game.

"The seniors have put in a lot of effort and time into the program," Harding said. "It was fun to get those guys a win on their senior night."

With the victory, Louisburg improved to 3—4 on the season and now turns its attention to the final game of the regular season this Friday as the Wildcats travel to Spring Hill.

Wildcats put together complete game in win over Wichita West

Louisburg turned in its most complete performance of the season Friday night, overwhelming Wichita West 49–6 in non-league action and it couldn't have come at a better time.

The victory gave them their second win of the season as the Wildcats have had to deal with youth and injuries at the same time. Still, Louisburg put on a show in front of its home fans as it scored 28 first quarter points and never looked back.

"We have certainly needed this," Louisburg coach Drew Harding said. "We have been in a lot of close games this year. Last week we played a really good team and battled and we have been getting better. To have a game where we can show that on the scoreboard is very rewarding.

"We certainly have been young and when you have injuries it certainly magnifies your youth. But it is the next man up and the positive out that situation is you get kids in and see what they can do on a Friday night. Hopefully it will be beneficial for us down the road.

Louisburg's defense set the tone early, pitching a shutout until the fourth quarter and forcing three turnovers. Cole Heinrich and Lincoln Nielsen each came away with interceptions, while John Guetterman forced a fumble that Mathias Wright recovered.

The Wildcats' special teams were just as dominant, blocking three punts. Bryce Thompson led the charge with two blocks — one of which Wright scooped up in the end zone for a touchdown — while Will Norton added another block to keep the Pioneers pinned deep in their own territory.

"Defense played with good energy and effort," Harding said. "We missed a few tackles on a few drives, but all in all we played well on that side of the football.

Louisburg wasted no time getting on the board, racing out to a 28-0 first-quarter lead. Blaise Vohs opened the scoring with a 3-yard touchdown run and added another from four yards out.

Quarterback Max Amren connected with Guetterman for a 14-yard touchdown, then hit Bryce Thompson for a two-point conversion. Wright capped the explosive opening quarter with the touchdown on the blocked punt.

"We started fairly well against Eudora last week, but this was the best we have started all year," Harding said. "We talked about how we wanted to get a 3-and out and block a punt and we were able to do those things right away. It was a fun to see the things that we have worked and emphasized on all week come to fruition and we did a good job.

After a quiet second quarter, the Wildcats erupted again in the third. Amren tossed a 20-yard touchdown to Guetterman, broke free for a 50-yard scoring run, and found Ayden Spradling for a 6-yard touchdown to extend the lead to 49-0.

Wichita West's Colby Eck-Watkins broke the shutout with an 8-yard run in the fourth quarter.

Louisburg's offense was efficient all night. Vohs rushed for 98 yards on 12 carries and Amren added 89 yards on just four attempts. Through the air, Amren completed all six of his passes for 53 yards and three touchdowns. Cooper Kilgore added a 38-yard completion in his lone attempt.

Guetterman led the receiving corps with four catches for 45 yards and two touchdowns, while Spradling hauled in two passes for 44 yards and a score.

"We were able to spread the ball around and get it to different playmakers," Harding said. "They all did a good job with the ball in their hands and none of that is possible without our offensive line playing well. They are getting better and better and had a really good night."

Defensively, Guetterman also led the way with 11 tackles. Norton added 10, followed by Amren with seven and Wright with six.

Louisburg (2-4) returns home Friday to host Ottawa for Senior Night.

"I think our goal this season was to always be playing our best football at the end of the year, but we know that we have taken some strides and getting better the last few weeks," Harding said. "We just need to take another step (against Ottawa) and put a good product on the field and compete against a good football team.

Wildcats fall to Eudora in homecoming loss

Louisburg faced its toughest test of the season Friday on homecoming as the Wildcats squared off with Eudora.

It is the same Cardinal team that had beaten two of the top teams in the Frontier League — Spring Hill and Ottawa — in back-to-back weeks. Despite their best efforts to stay within striking distance, the Wildcats couldn't hold them off as the Cardinals scored a pair of fourth quarter touchdowns to pull away for a 35-7 victory over Louisburg.

"I felt like we played a more complete game than we have the past few weeks," Louisburg coach Drew Harding said. "Unfortunately, they are a really good team and they made us pay for our mistakes."

Eudora jumped out early behind the legs of senior running back Grayson Moody, who found the end zone on a 1-yard plunge in the first quarter and added a 5-yard touchdown run in the second. The Cardinals took a 14—0 lead into halftime, keeping the Wildcats' offense quiet through two quarters.

Louisburg had a chance to put one in the endzone in the first half as the Wildcats drove it all the way to the 2-yard line, but Eudora intercepted a Wildcat pass in the endzone

Louisburg finally broke through in the third when Blaise Vohs sprinted 17 yards for a touchdown, adding the extra point himself to cut the deficit to 14-7. But Eudora quickly responded with a 4-yard touchdown run from Keelyn Duncan, stretching the lead back to 21-7.

The Cardinals put the game away in the fourth quarter. Quarterback Houstyn Carnagie connected with Preston White on a 35-yard touchdown pass, and Moody capped his big night with a 3-yard scoring run to close out the 35-7 victory.

Vohs led the Wildcats' offense with 132 rushing yards on 22 carries, while Tate McGreer added 45 yards on four attempts. Quarterback Max Amren completed 5 of 10 passes for 34 yards, finding John Guetterman twice for 19 yards and Ayden Filkins once for 16.

Defensively, Guetterman led the charge with 17 tackles, followed by Bryce Thompson and Will Norton, who each recorded eight stops.

"The defense played pretty well overall," Harding said. "They started about as good as you could've asked by getting a 3 and out on the first drive."

Despite the loss, the Wildcats showed flashes of resilience, particularly on the ground. Louisburg (1-4) will look to bounce back this Friday as they host Wichita West, which also has a 1-4 record.

"We are looking to continue to improve," Harding said. "We really felt like we started to figure some things out this past week and so hopefully we can continue to take steps in that direction. We know the season is going quickly so it is important to take advantage of each and every week that we get."

BONNER SPRINGS — It may have taken a little bit longer than it wanted, but the Louisburg football team snapped its 3-game losing streak to earn its first win of the season.

The Wildcats got a pair of touchdowns from senior Blaise Vohs and the Louisburg defense took care of the rest in a 21-0 shutout on the road at Bonner Springs.

"It feels good for sure," Louisburg coach Drew Harding said. "We didn't play very well last week, and so to have a good week of practice and see it rewarded with a win, always feels good."

Louisburg (1-4) broke a scoreless tie in the second quarter when Blaise Vohs broke free for a 24-yard touchdown run, then added the extra point to put the Wildcats up 7-0. Minutes later, Max Amren connected with Braxton Eastland on a 28-yard

touchdown pass right before halftime, with another successful Vohs PAT extending the lead to 14-0.

The Wildcats capped the scoring in the fourth quarter when Vohs found the end zone again, this time from 14 yards out, and added his third extra point of the night.

"We preached this week that we didn't have to go out and make highlight plays to make things happen," Harding said. "We all just had to do our jobs better and that leads to big plays, which we did a better job of this week."

Vohs, who had been out the last two games with an injury, led the offensive charge, rushing for 113 yards and two scores on just eight carries. He also contributed in the passing game with a 17-yard reception and handled kicking duties.

"Blaise certainly gave us a big lift," Harding said. "He made some big time plays for us from the running back position. He is tough to tackle and has good speed so we are certainly excited to have him back."

On the defensive side, sophomore linebacker John Guetterman was a presence, racking up a team-high 13 tackles. Will Norton added seven stops, and Cole Heinrich chipped in six, while senior lineman Johnny Hendrickson registered two sacks.

The Wildcats' defense kept Bonner Springs off the scoreboard for all four quarters, marking their first shutout of the season.

"Overall, I thought we saw a lot of improvement," Harding said. "Defensively we were able to pitch a shutout, which is always tough to do. I thought we played well on special teams. Offensively we had too many turnovers, but saw a lot of improvement on that side as well."

Louisburg will try and make it two straight wins this Friday as the Wildcats host Eudora for their homecoming contest.

CLAY CENTER — A promising start quickly unraveled for the Louisburg Wildcats last Friday, as costly penalties and turnovers doomed their chances in a 34-7 road loss to Clay Center.

Louisburg had two touchdowns called back due to penalties in the first half and committed four turnovers in the game — mistakes that proved too much to overcome against a physical Clay Center squad.

The Tigers struck early with a 2-yard touchdown run from Eisaac Girton in the first quarter. Girton added another score in the second, this time a 38-yard dash to give Clay Center a 13-0 lead heading into halftime.

Despite the early setbacks, Louisburg responded in the third quarter with their lone touchdown of the night. Quarterback Max Amren connected with Martin Soto for a 20-yard score, and Maddox Day added the extra point to cut the deficit to 13-7.

But any momentum Louisburg had was quickly erased in the fourth quarter. Clay Center rattled off 21 unanswered points — including a 2-yard touchdown by Drew Hoffman, another Girton scoring run from 11 yards out, and a 41-yard interception return by Cayden Schwab.

Offensively, the Wildcats showed flashes of potential. Tate McGreer led the ground game with 48 yards on seven carries, while Bryce Thompson added 34 yards on 12 attempts. Amren finished 10-of-22 passing for 83 yards, with Soto, Ayden Filkins, and John Guetterman among the key targets.

Still, the Wildcats were left frustrated by missed opportunities and self-inflicted wounds.

"This game could be a positive if we can learn from it," Louisburg head coach Drew Harding said. "I think this game really showed if you have a bad week of preparation you are probably not going to play well on a Friday night. Unfortunately for us, we didn't prepare very well and so the result wasn't where we want to be."

Wildcat football falls to rival Paola in home opener

Louisburg has found itself in a pair of close games to start the 2025 season, but unfortunately, the Wildcats couldn't get the big play they were looking for in either one — which included Friday's home opener against Paola.

The Rivalry on 68 wasn't kind to the Wildcats as the Panthers pulled away in the second half and handed Louisburg a 28-21 loss. In a contest filled with game-changing plays, the Panthers made just a couple more.

The biggest swing came late in the third quarter. Down 21-14, the Wildcats drove all the way down to the 1-yard line. After a couple Paola stops backed it up to the 4, Louisburg starting quarterback Max Amren had to leave the game with cramps on third down.

Louisburg decided to go for it on fourth down at the 5 and the Panther defense held the Wildcats short. The Panthers swung the momentum with a fourth down conversion of their own.

On fourth and 2 near midfield, Paola running back Bodhi Shay broke free around the left side and scored on a 46-yard touchdown early in the fourth quarter in what was a 14-point swing for the Panthers.

"There were probably several turning points in this one," Harding said. "We had a really good drive going and weren't able to finish it off and then they got a big fourth down where they were able to turn it into a touchdown. That was a big one, and then at the end of the first half we weren't able to keep them out of the endzone and gave up a score. We aren't playing our best situational football just yet, but we will keep working on it.

"That is your rival, so you want to beat your rival, so these types of losses sting a little extra. They are a good football team and they can do a lot of good things."

Louisburg (0-2) wasted no time getting on the scoreboard to begin the game as sophomore Mathias Wright broke free for a 90-yard kickoff return for a touchdown to put the Wildcats up early.

Paola answered on its first possession, and it ended on a 2-yard touchdown run by Shay to tie the game. The Wildcats took the lead back again late in the first quarter as Amren found the endzone on a 5-yard touchdown run.

In the second quarter, the Panthers answered as quarterback Mason Stein hit Trace Metcalf in the back of the endzone for a 10-yard pass. Then with seconds left in the first half, Stein found Sasha Pichnenko for a leaping 12-yard grab in the corner of the endzone and the Panthers took a 21-14 halftime lead.

After Shay's big run in the fourth quarter made it a two-score game, the Wildcats kept fighting as Amren hit Martin Soto for

a 32-yard pass on a third and 23. It eventually ended on an 8-yard touchdown run by Amren.

The Wildcats got the ball back with under two minutes remaining, but time ran out on their possible game-tying drive.

"I was obviously proud of the way our guys battled," Harding said. "It was a pretty similar situation to our first game where we were down two scores in the second half and were able to get back in it. There wasn't a lot of flow to the game. Both sides were cramping and it really slowed the game down. At the same time, we have to play more complete football to put us in better situations."

Amren was big on offense for the Wildcats. The junior quarterback led the team with 242 total yards of offense, including a pair of touchdowns, and 125 yards rushing.

Soto was Amren's favorite target on the night as he had five catches for 94 yards. Sophomore John Guetterman led the Wildcats on defense with a team-high 12 tackles and fellow linebacker Bryce Thompson added eight.

Louisburg will look for that first win this Friday as the Wildcats travel to Clay Center for a 7 p.m. kickoff.

"We have to play more complete football," Harding said "We have been making a lot of mistakes that hurt ourselves. We have these lapses where we don't execute, but we have to continue to play a complete football game and be better in situations. We will battle a tough Clay Center team with a long road trip. We know it won't be easy, but we will get back to work to continue to get better."

Wildcat football falls short on road in loss to Tonganoxie in season debut



TONGANOXIE — In a back-and-forth contest filled with momentum shifts, Louisburg needed one more positive thing to go its way.

Unfortunately for the Wildcats, it never came.

It was the first varsity game for several Louisburg players Friday in Tonganoxie. On a team that returned just four starters from a season ago, the Wildcats came up just short in a 20-14 loss to Tonganoxie.

"I felt like we competed well," Louisburg coach Drew Harding said. "There were a couple of times in the game where there was a big momentum swing in their favor and we continued to

battle and give ourselves a chance at the end. We didn't execute very well in key moments and so that is something we will need to clean up as the season progresses."

After a scoreless first quarter, it was Tonganoxie that struck first as it drove down the field on scored on a 2-yard touchdown by quarterback Bodee Maslak. The Wildcats, however, answered right back.

Louisburg quarterback Max Amren reeled off several big runs during a 7-minute drive for the Wildcats and eventually scored on a 15-yard run to tie the game after a Blaise Vohs extra point.

However, with under two minutes left in the first half, the Chieftains put together a couple big plays and drove down the field to score another touchdown right before halftime and took a 14-7 lead.

Tonganoxie made it a two score game with a touchdown on its first drive of the second half, but the Wildcats answered again — this time through the air. Amren connected with John Guetterman for a long pass play, which set up another pass from Amren to Martin Soto in the endzone, which was eventually called for pass interference.

That set up a 12-yard touchdown run from Bryce Thompson that cut the Tonganoxie lead to just six.

The Wildcat special teams and defense then stepped up to stop a pair of Tonganoxie drives. Senior Rickey Giles blocked a field goal and was picked up by Mathias Wright.

After a Louisburg turnover that stopped the ensuing drive, the Wildcat defense struck again, this time Thompson forced a fumble as the Tonganoxie runner was inching toward the endzone and Guetterman recovered it.

Thompson was all over the place defensively for the Wildcats

as he registered a team-high 12 tackles, while Guetterman had nine and Giles had eight.

"Defensively I thought we played pretty well except for two drives," Harding said. "The drive at the end of the first half and the drive coming out of halftime we didn't play with the kind of effort we need to play with. We will need to continue to work on the fundamentals of tackling and getting off blocks."

The Wildcats had one more opportunity with under two minutes left in the contest. Amren connected with Soto for a 47-yard gain to the Tonganoxie 25. However, from there, the Wildcats would turn the ball over on downs.

Amren led the Wildcat offense with 161 yards total offense, including 110 yards through the air. Soto and Guetterman finished with 60 and 52 yards receiving, respectively.

"I felt offensively we were kind of up and down throughout the night," Harding said. "We would have flashes of quality football and then have moments were we didn't excute well. I think consistency will be a big point of emphasis for us moving forward offensively."

The Wildcats will try and get that first win of the season this Friday as the Wildcats host Paola at Wildcat Stadium. Kickoff is set for 7 p.m.
