

Wildcats win second straight regional title to advance to state tourney



The Louisburg girls soccer team celebrated with their regional championship trophy on May 21 following its 6-0 win over Baldwin.

For the second time in as many years, the Louisburg girls soccer team has found its way to the state tournament.

The No. 1 seed Wildcats hosted No. 9 Baldwin on May 21 in the Class 4-1A regional championship, and from the opening whistle, Louisburg dominated play.

Louisburg scored three goals in each half and earned a 6-0 result over the Bulldogs, and captured its second straight regional title.

"Winning regionals was an exciting moment and a great

accomplishment for the team," Louisburg coach Jordan Roquemore said. "We put ourselves in a good position from our play this season and winning this title was a testament to a lot of hard work that this group has put in. However, there is not a single one of us on this team that is ready to stop here. We are looking ahead to state."

The Wildcats advanced to the state quarterfinals with the victory and will host another Frontier League team in Eudora at 5:30 p.m. on May 26.

Louisburg was the considerable favorite going into the regional championship, especially after defeating Baldwin by the same 6-0 score last month.

However, the Wildcat players didn't want to take anything for granted and made sure they got out to a good start.

"We talked before the game about being 'hope-crushers' this game," Roquemore said. "In one way, we played the villain because we did not want to give Baldwin any room for hope in this game. We came out fast and aggressive and scored quickly. No one on our team was underestimating Baldwin, but we also realized that we needed to come out strong and take the game away."

The Wildcats wasted no time getting on the board as they struck first in the match's opening minute.

Freshman Cora Roche put the Wildcats up 1-0 in the first 15 seconds of the match. Another freshman, Kahlan Harris, scored seven minutes later on an assist from senior Baileigh Johnson.

A few minutes later, Harris struck again as she scored off a rebound on a shot from freshman Briella Diehl and the Wildcats took that 3-0 lead into halftime.

Senior Rowan Yows put Louisburg up four early in the second with her first goal. Sophomore Merritt McIntire got in on the scoring with a goal thanks to an assists from Johnson.

Seconds later, Johnson scored to seal the win thanks to an assist from Yows.

"All due respect to Baldwin who worked hard and played with a lot of grit, but we did not play our best game," Roquemore said. "We executed really well on finishing shots and crashing the box, but we did not possess to our potential this game. Our passing and connections were very messy at times and overly-offensive. It paid off in goals, but there were many times it did not look great. Moving forward, I want to get back to some of our best passing and team play."

Defensively, the Wildcats limited Baldwin to just two shots on target and Louisburg goalie Ally Brown earned the clean sheet, which was her 11th of the season.

"We were very aggressive on offense this game and opened up a lot of opportunities in front of the goal," Roquemore said.

"Hat's off to Baldwin's goalkeeper with 20 saves and a few really excellent moments. Our defense did a solid job tonight turning away opportunities in our defensive third."

Now, the Wildcats will try and earn a spot in the state final four on May 26 when they host Eudora in the first round of the state tournament.

Louisburg edged Eudora for a 2-1 victory back in April and the Wildcats know it will be a challenge to knock the Cardinals off again.

"We are ready for Eudora and we are looking forward to a great game," Roquemore said. "We both have all our players healthy and I anticipate a tough game. Eudora is always competitive and we have had years of close, hard-fought games over my five seasons."

Wildcats roll Paola on Senior Night to secure No. 1 seed

Coming off a hard-fought loss to De Soto earlier in the week, the Louisburg girls soccer team had a chance to put that behind them and do a little celebrating.

The Wildcats hosted Paola on May 15, and it was also Senior Night as they honored their five seniors and their families. As it turned out, it was the perfect ending to the regular season.

Louisburg put together a dominant performance as it blanked

Paola, 8-0, and ended its regular season with a 13-3 record. The victory also secured the No. 1 seed in the Class 4-1A playoffs.

Seniors Jaden Bentz, Ally Brown, Baileigh Johnson, Riley May and Rowan Yows were all recognized with their parents prior to the contest.

“Senior night was a fun, emotional night for the team,” Louisburg coach Jordan Roquemore said. “We have a wonderful group of seniors who have been exceptional leaders, players and friends this season. Getting a shutout with an 8-0 victory was just icing on the cake and a great way to celebrate that group.”

The Wildcats scored three first half goals to take the lead at halftime and scored five more times in the second half. Louisburg had seven different goal-scorers on the night, including a pair from Yows.

Layla Sewell, Johnson, Lila Edwards, Kahlan Harris, May and Briella Diehl each found the back of the net and got in the scoring column. Brown and Ellia Gibbons combined on the clean sheet.

“We passed and possessed really well this game,” Roquemore said. “We also adapted to Rowan being man-marked and found alternatives to using a clogged middle in our attacking third. We also set a season shooting record this game with 26 shots on goal and 49 shots overall, with the majority coming in the second half. Although I don’t love our accuracy in those numbers, I do appreciate our relentless attack.”

Louisburg will look to continue those offensive numbers in the postseason as the Wildcats host No. 9 seed Baldwin on May 21 for the regional championship. Roquemore and the Wildcats are hoping to make it a memorable run in the postseason.

“Getting the number one spot was exactly what we wanted,” Roquemore said. “It gives us a great path forward in the postseason and I am really proud of our team for earning that position this year. We have some tough tests ahead of us, but I am really excited to see what we can do. We are all in.”

Wildcats battle De Soto in road loss

With the No. 1 seed in the regional playoffs on the line, Louisburg had one task during its road game at De Soto – allow as few goals as possible.

Normally, that is the main objective for every team that takes the pitch, but the Wildcats needed to keep De Soto – one of

the better teams in Class 5A – to under four goals to stay in contention for the top spot.

The Wildcats did just that as they held De Soto scoreless in the first half and allowed just two second half goals in the 2-0 loss. However, they were anything but dejected afterward.

“From the outside, it looks like a simple loss to De Soto,” Roquemore said. “However, this was a big victory for us. We executed our plan, adapting our play and being highly physical and aggressive on defense. Every other 4A team to play De Soto has been mercy-ruled with 8-0 or higher losses.

“The first half of this game showed everyone that we are capable of hanging with some of the best teams out there. We kept the goals scored against us low, which is now benefiting us as the top seed in the East. Our record is tied with Kansas City Christian and Atchison, but our goals against record is better, which allowed us to get the top spot for the playoffs.”

Louisburg had a strong game from its back line of Jaden Bentz, Lila Edwards, Caroline Apple and Faith Sewell. Bentz, along with Cora Roche and Baileigh Johnson, were marked on De Soto's top players most of the night.

Senior goalie Ally Brown also did her best to limit the damage as she had 17 saves. De Soto scored early in the second half on a penalty kick and then answered with another goal late in the second half.

"De Soto was the hardest game we played all year," Roquemore said. "De Soto has three of the best players we've seen all year and some extremely good shooters. We had a clear game plan that was defensive with opportunities to counter-attack. For the first half, we executed really well on defense, holding De Soto to 0 goals and only 9 shots on goal. We had some mild success in countering, but not enough to get a good

shot off."

Wildcats blank Ottawa, Basehor-Linwood to improve winning streak to 8

OTTAWA – Louisburg squared off with Ottawa for the second time in a week, and although both matches ended up in Wildcat victories, the matches were drastically different.

After a slow start in its previous game with the Cyclones, Louisburg wasted no time getting going as the Wildcats scored

six first half goals and cruised to an 8-0 victory at home on May 8. It was also the Wildcats' eighth consecutive victory.

Louisburg scored just once in the opening half of the first matchup before pulling away with a 4-goal win.

"We played an absurdly better game against Ottawa the second time around," Louisburg coach Jordan Roquemore said. "Honestly, I was pleasantly surprised how much more effective we were against them on Thursday at home."

"When we first played Ottawa, we got bogged down by their defense in our attacking third. Our possession was not bad and we controlled much of the game, but our offensive combinations and finishing was really rough and not team-centric. We talked about some tactical adjustments we wanted to make and the girls not only applied them, they executed them at a very high level."

Edwards, a defender, put the Wildcats up 2-0 on a shot from about 20 yards out for her second goal of the year. About three minutes later, Yows struck again as she dribbled through the Cyclone defense to make it a 3-goal lead.

Senior Jaden Bentz, another defender, scored her first goal of the season as she had an high-arching shot that was out of reach of the keeper to make it 4-0.

Just moments later, senior Baileigh Johnson found the back of the net on a cross from Yows. At the end of the first half, freshman Kahlan Harris struck for a goal to give the Wildcats a 6-0 halftime advantage.

Harris scored her second goal of the game about 30 seconds into the second half on an assist from freshman Cora Roche. Then three minutes later, junior Mena Fercho ended the match with a goal in the mercy-rule victory.

In all, the Wildcats had 23 shots, including 16 on target in just 43 minutes of action.

“Although I am always happy to see Rowan scoring goals, it was also nice to see others getting on the board on Thursday,” Roquemore said. “It says more about our team playing at its full potential. We play at our best when the entire team is playing both offense and defense. Everyone contributes to

creating opportunities and stopping threats. If we rely completely on individual players to carry the load, we become easier to anticipate and much less potent in our play.”

Defensively, the Wildcats recorded their ninth shutout on the season as Ally Brown and Ellia Gibbons combined for the clean sheet.

Louisburg will try and continue its winning streak on May 12 as the Wildcats travel to De Soto.

Louisburg shuts out Basehor-Linwood

Louisburg went on the road to face off with Basehor-Linwood on May 6 and put together another strong showing.

The Wildcats scored four first half goals and that was all they needed in a 4-0 victory over the Bobcats.

“We had an excellent first half against Basehor,” Roquemore said. “I felt that we were playing some of our best soccer with our dynamic possession and opportunities created. We took over and we didn’t give them any chances.

“During the second half, we experimented with some formation changes that we expect to implement in future games. It was good for learning and getting comfortable with something different and more defensive. However, it also limited our offensive firepower. I’m glad we got the opportunity to try it and I’m hopeful it pays off if we have to use it later in the season.”

“I feel like a broken record with Rowan, but she is on fire and is a force to be reckoned with while going to goal,” Roquemore said. “This was her third hat trick in a row which is rare to say the least. I also thought Cora’s goal was excellent. She has been quietly having an excellent season and I want to find ways to incorporate her more into our offensive front.”

Defensively, the Wildcats limited the Bobcats to just one shot on goal and senior goalie Ally Brown recorded the clean sheet.

Yows hat trick paces Wildcats past Ottawa for sixth straight win

OTTAWA – For most of the first half, the Louisburg girls soccer team dominated possession and put together several shots on goal during its May 1 game at Ottawa.

The only problem was many of those shots didn't want to go in. That all changed in the second half.

Louisburg, which had a one-goal lead at halftime, scored three

more times in the second half as the Wildcats cruised to a 4-0 victory over the Cyclones.

It was the sixth straight victory for the Wildcats (10-2) and their second straight shutout.

“Ottawa was a good game for us to grow from,” Louisburg coach Jordan Roquemore said. “Ottawa was firmly planted in defense and bogged us down in the middle throughout the whole game. We found out that playing our normal possession game through the middle was not working as well. We would move the ball into the attacking third and then get clogged by their layered defense. Overall, it was not our best game, but still a win and one that offers some valuable lessons.”



“Before the second half, we talked about some adjustments and our own mindsets. We came out roaring and scored two goals quickly to get back on top.”

The Wildcats wasted no time getting on the board after halftime as freshman Kahlan Harris got the equalizer 15 seconds in thanks to an assist from senior Rowan Yows.

About four minutes later, Yows got a goal of her own as she

dribbled through the Eudora defense and found the corner of the net to get the game-winner.

Louisburg had 16 shots on the night, including ones from Harris, Yows, Layla Sewell, Sydney York, Jaden Bentz and Cora Roche.

It was the Louisburg defense that limited the Cardinals' looks at the net as Bentz, Roche, Faith Sewell, Lila Edwards, Rylee Moore and others shutdown the Eudora attack.

Louisburg scored five first half goals and never looked back as the Wildcats downed the Blue Comets, 8-0, to earn their third consecutive win.


The Wildcats got contributions from up and down their lineup as six different players scored and four of the eight goals were assisted.

To do that, the Wildcats were going to have to win on the road. They got it done in a tight matchup on April 15 at Tonganoxie.


